#### Survey Methodology

- Survey in 4 languages: English, Spanish, Chinese and Vietnamese
- Outreach done through:
  - Advertisement in SJ Mercury News
  - Cities age-friendly task forces
  - Meals on Wheels
  - Community centers and events
  - Mobile home parks
  - Low income senior housing
  - LGBT Community
- Survey dates: May 2016 October 2016
- 37 focus groups were also conducted
- Participation was from all 15 cities in Santa Clara County



#### Survey Respondents by Gender



#### Survey Respondents by Age


Seniors between the ages of 65 and 74 years old account for 41% of respondents

#### **Current Relationship Status**


54% of older adults in Santa Clara County are currently married, followed by 17% who are divorced.

#### Race & Hispanic Origin


□ The majority of older adult respondents in Santa Clara County are White (64%).

### Any Disabilities or Health Issues Limiting Work and Activities


71% of older adults in Santa Clara County reported having no disabilities or health issues that limit their work or other activities.

#### **Level of Education**


Approximately two-thirds (65%) of older adults in Santa Clara County have 4-yr college degree or higher, with one-third (33%) having a graduate or professional degree.

#### Internet Usage


Two-thirds (66%) of older adults in Santa Clara County reported accessing the internet several times a day to check e-mail, pay their bills, etc.

■ More than 4 in 10 (44%) older adults in Santa Clara County have an annual household income of \$75,000 or more.





#### City Rating by Age Group


Compared to younger seniors, older seniors ages 75 and older report their city as an excellent or very good place to live as they age.

#### Length of Time Living in the City


Approximately two-thirds (65%) of older adults have lived in their cities for 25 years or more.

#### Moving out of City by Age Group


Younger seniors (ages 50 to 64) are more likely to consider moving out of their current city compared to older seniors (ages 75 and older).

### Reason to Move: Too expensive to maintain current home

Compared to other racial/ethnic groups, a higher percentage of African Americans seniors reported considering moving out of their city because of the expense of maintaining their current home.



Compared to other racial/ethnic groups, a higher percentage of African Americans seniors reported considering moving out of their city because they were looking for a home to live independently in as they aged.



#### Reasons to Move: Need better health care facilities


A greater percentage of Asian/PI and Latino seniors reported considering moving out of their city because they would need better health care facilities compared to seniors of all other racial/ethnic groups and the County overall.

#### Reasons to Move: Need a lower cost of living


A greater percentage of African Americans and Latino seniors reported moving out of their city due to the cost of living compared to Asian/Pacific Islander and White seniors.

#### Remain in City while Aging

Latino and Asian/Pacific Islander seniors were slightly more likely to report that it is extremely or very important for them to remain in their city as they age, compared to African American and White senior adults.





### Housing Needs for the Aged: Bathroom Modifications


□ A greater percentage of seniors below the age of 75 report needing to make bathroom modifications to their homes compared to seniors over the age of 75.

#### Housing Needs for the Aged: Medical Response System


□ A greater percentage of seniors below the age of 75 report needing a medical response system compared to seniors over the age of 75.


■ A greater percentage of Asian/Pacific Islander and African American seniors reported the need to install a medical emergency response system compared to Latino and White seniors.


#### City Essentials: Good Home Repair Contractors

■ In Santa Clara, more than 4 out of 5 (84%) of respondents feel that affordable housing options are extremely or very important to have in their cities.



□ In Santa Clara county, 3 out of 4 (75%) respondents think that home cleaning and cooking services are extremely or very important to have in their cities.





#### Good and Accessible Sidewalks


91% of respondents reported that sidewalks in good condition, free from obstruction and safe for pedestrian use and accessible for wheelchairs (or other assistive mobility devices) are extremely or very important in their cities.

#### Public Buildings and Facilities Accessibility

Almost 9 out of 10 (89%) respondents think having wellmaintained public buildings and facilities that are accessible to people of different physical abilities is extremely or very important to have in their cities.



#### Well-maintained public restrooms accessibility





#### Means of Transportation: Drive myself


Though seniors of all racial groups reported driving around themselves, a higher percentage of White seniors reported driving around themselves compared to other racial/ethnic groups.


Though seniors of all age groups reported driving around themselves, a higher percentage of seniors below the age of 75 reported driving around themselves compared to other age groups.

#### Means of Transportation: Walk


Approximately 3 out of 5 (61%) seniors in Santa Clara County reported walking as a means of getting around.

#### City Transportation: Special transportation services


□ Almost 9 out of 10 (89%) respondents said that special transportation services for people with disabilities and older adults are extremely or very important in their cities.

#### City Transportation: Well-maintained streets


Almost all respondents (93%) feel that it is extremely or very important to have well-maintained streets in their cities.

Almost all (93%) of the respondents think that having easy to read traffic signs is extremely or very important to have in their cities.




### **Community Information**



 Older adults of all racial/ethnic groups in Santa Clara County reported using their local senior centers as a resource for community information.



# Local Senior Centers as a Resource for Community Information by Age Group


 Older adults of all age groups in Santa Clara County reported using their local senior centers as a resource for community information.

# Internet as Resource for Community Information by Race & Hispanic Origin



## Internet as Resource for Community Information by Age Group


□ A greater percentage of older adults below the age of 75 reported using the internet for community information compared to adults ages 75 and older.

# Doctor or Health Care Professional as Resource for Community Information by Race & Hispanic Origin


A greater percentage of African American older adults reported using a doctor of health care professional as a resource for community information compared to adults of other racial/ethnic backgrounds.
