Survey Methodology


- Survey in 4 languages: English, Spanish, Chinese and Vietnamese
- Outreach done through:
 - Advertisement in SJ Mercury News
 - Cities age-friendly task forces
 - Meals on Wheels
 - Community centers and events
 - Mobile home parks
 - Low income senior housing
 - LGBT Community
- Survey dates: May 2016 October 2016
- 37 focus groups were also conducted
- Participation was from all 15 cities in Santa Clara County

Survey Respondents by Gender



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
Survey Respondents by Age

Seniors between the ages of 65 and 74 years old account for 41% of respondents




Current Relationship Status

54% of older adults in Santa Clara County are currently married, followed by 17% who are divorced.




Race & Hispanic Origin

Any Disabilities or Health Issues Limiting Work and Activities


71% of older adults in Santa Clara County reported having no disabilities or health issues that limit their work or other activities.


Level of Education

Approximately two-thirds (65%) of older adults in Santa Clara County have 4-yr college degree or higher, with one-third (33%) having a graduate or professional degree.



Internet Usage


Two-thirds (66%) of older adults in Santa Clara County reported accessing the internet several times a day to check e-mail, pay their bills, etc.



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Annual Household Income

More than 4 in 10 (44%) older adults in Santa Clara County have an annual household income of \$75,000 or more.



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
City Rating by Age Group

Compared to younger seniors, older seniors ages 75 and older report their city as an excellent or very good place to live as they age.



Approximately two-thirds (65%) of older adults have lived in their cities for 25 years or more.

Length of Time Living in the City





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
Moving out of City by Age Group

Younger seniors (ages 50 to 64) are more likely to consider moving out of their current city compared to older seniors (ages 75 and older).




Reason to Move: Too expensive to maintain current home

Compared to other racial/ethnic groups, a higher percentage of African Americans seniors reported considering moving out of their city because of the expense of maintaining their current home.



Reasons to Move: Looking for a home to live independently


Compared to other racial/ethnic groups, a higher percentage of African Americans seniors reported considering moving out of their city because they were looking for a home to live independently in as they aged.



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
Reasons to Move: Need better health care facilities

A greater percentage of Asian/PI and Latino seniors reported considering moving out of their city because they would need better health care facilities compared to seniors of all other racial/ethnic groups and the County overall.




Reasons to Move: Need a lower cost of living

A greater percentage of African Americans and Latino seniors reported moving out of their city due to the cost of living compared to Asian/Pacific Islander and White seniors.



Remain in City while Aging

Latino and Asian/Pacific Islander seniors were slightly more likely to report that it is extremely or very important for them to remain in their city as they age, compared to African American and White senior adults.




Health and Wellness



Self Rating of Health by Race & Hispanic Origin

 A greater percentage of Latino (15%), African American (13%) and Asian/Pacific Islander (13%) adults reported their overall health as being fair or poor, compared to White adults (5%) and the County overall (8%).




Self Rating of Health by Race & Hispanic Origin

Engaging in Physical Exercise by Race & Hispanic Origin


A greater percentage of White and Asian/PI (86%) seniors report engaging in physical activities several times a week to everyday, compared to African

American (77%) and Latino (78%) seniors.

Older adults of all racial/ethnic groups feel it is important to have fitness activities specifically geared to older adults.



Importance of Service Helping Seniors Finding Health and Supportive Services by Race & Hispanic Origin

A greater percentage of African American (93%), Asian/PI (93%) and Latino (97%) adults feel it is extremely very important to have a service that helps seniors find an access health and support services, compared to White (82%) adults.




Importance of Easy to Find Information on Local Health and Supportive Services by Race & Hispanic Origin

A greater percentage of African American (97%), Asian/PI (92%) and Latino (96%) adults feel it is extremely or very important to find information on local health and supportive services compared to White (84%) adults.



Importance of Well-trained Certified Home Health Care Providers

88% of older adults in Santa Clara County feel it is extremely or very important to have well-trained certified home health care providers in their city.




Social Participation, Inclusion and Education Opportunities



Frequency of Interactions with Others by Race & Hispanic Origin

Fewer Asian/PI (55%) and Latino (65%) seniors report interacting with friends, family or neighbors in their city about once a day or more than once a day compared to African American (70%) and White (72%) seniors.



Senior Center for Continuing Education or Self-Improvement


51% of respondents in Santa Clara County reported that they typically go to a senior center for continuing education and self-improvement.



No Participation in any Continuing Education or Self-Improvement Classes


1 out of 6 respondents (16%) said that typically, they do not participate in any continuing education or self-improvement classes.


Importance of Activities Geared to Older Adults by Race & Hispanic Origin

Compared to other racial/ethnic groups, a greater percentage of Latino seniors (91%) said it was extremely or very important to have activities specifically geared to older adults in their cities.




Importance of Activities Involving Young and Older People by Age Group

A greater percentage of younger seniors between the ages of 50 and 64 felt it was extremely or very important to have activities involving young and older people in their cities.



Importance of Local Schools Activities Involving Older Adults by Race & Hispanic Origin


A greater percentage of African American and Latino seniors (79%) said it was extremely or very important to have local schools in their cities that involve older adults in event and activities.

A greater percentage of seniors below the age of 75 said it was extremely or very important to have local schools in their cities that involve older adults in event and activities.





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
Importance of a Large Selection of Volunteer Activities

A greater percentage of African American (81%) and Latino (87%) seniors said it was very or extremely important to have a range of volunteer activities to chose from, compared to seniors of all other racial/ethnic groups.



Importance of Easy to Find Information about Local Volunteer Opportunities



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
Importance of Transportation to and from Volunteer Activities for Those Who Need It

A greater percentage of African American (81%) and Latino (87%) seniors said it was very or extremely important to have transportation to and from volunteer activities for those who need it, compared to seniors of all other racial/ethnic groups.



Likelihood to Continue to Work as Long as Possible

68% of working seniors said that they were extremely or very likely to continue to work for as long as possible.




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
Increased Incidences of Confusion or Memory Loss

 88% of respondents said they experienced increased incidences of confusion or memory loss in the past 12 months.




Consultation with Health Care Professional about Increased Confusion or Memory Loss

49% of respondents who had increased confusion and memory loss during the past 12 months said they had a consultation with a health care professional.




Provide Regular Care or Assistance to Friends or Family with Cognitive Impairment or Dementia

21% of respondents said they provided regular care or assistance to friends or family with cognitive impairment of dementia during the past month.



The Person You Care for Experienced Changes in Thinking or Remembering during the Past Year

3 out of 4 respondents (75%) observed changes in the thinking or remembering of the person they care for during the past year.



Community Support Needed to Care for Someone with Memory Problems or a Diagnosis with Dementia

- The top community supports respondents felt would be most helpful in caring for someone with memory problems or a diagnosis with dementia are:
 - Access to a physician who is trained in the diagnosis, assessment, and management of dementia
 - 24/7 access to specialists who can answer questions about dementia, medications and treatment options, care, options, care giving tips, services, available in your community referrals
 - Respite care
 - Legal and advance planning advice
